## From the Health Office...

**Seasonal Allergies:** "Achoo! " It's your son's third sneezing fit of the morning, and as you hand him another tissue you wonder if these cold-like symptoms – the sneezing, congestion, and runny nose – have something to do with the recent weather change. If he gets similar symptoms at the same time every year, you're likely right; seasonal allergies are at work. Even kids who have never had seasonal allergies I the past can develop. Seasonal allergies can start at almost any age, though they usually develop by the time someone is 10 years old and reach their peak in the early twenties.

<u>Signs and Symptoms</u>: Allergy symptoms which usually come on suddenly and last as long as a person is exposed to the allergen can include: **sneezing, itchy nose/throat, nasal congestion, runny nose, coughing.** These symptoms often come with **itchy, watery, and /or red eyes, which is called allergic conjunctivitis.** 

**Diagnosis:** Seasonal allergies are fairly easy to identify, talk with your Doctor and he will be able to make a diagnosis. They might also do a skin test or blood test to identify the allergen.

<u>Treatment:</u> There are many ways to treat seasonal allergies, depending on how severe the symptoms are. The most important part of treatment is knowing what allergens are at work. Some kids can get relief by reducing or eliminating exposure to allergens that bother them. If certain seasons cause symptoms, keep the windows closed, use air conditioning if possible, and stay indoors when pollen/ mold/weed counts are high. It's also a good idea to wash their hands or shower and change clothing after playing outside.

If reducing exposure isn't possible or effective, medicines can help ease allergy symptoms. These may include decongestants, antihistamines, and nasal spray steroids. If symptoms can't be managed with medicines, the Doctor may recommend taking your child to an allergist and be evaluated for allergy shots, which can help desensitize kids to specific allergens.

### **Regarding our grouping process:**

Parents often have questions about, or wonder what procedure is used to group students into classes for the next school year. The question is an important one as the process begins very soon.

At each elementary school a grouping committee consisting of classroom teachers, special educators, and support staff assist the principals with this process. Beginning in May with initial draft lists, students are grouped taking into consideration primarily the mix of boys and girls and the mixture of academic abilities. Because many new students register throughout the Spring and Summer, the process is not completed until mid August. Once class assignments are finalized, a letter will be e-mailed to parents indicating their child's room number and teacher. Our overall goal is to create balanced, heterogeneous classrooms at each grade level. This gives each child the optimum chance for a successful school year.

Beginning with spring conferences, staff is asked to **NOT** discuss placement with parents. Individual teachers cannot guarantee the placement of any student and requests for specific teachers will not be honored, but you may wish to share concerns about your child's particular educational needs. Again, these concerns will be considered by the grouping committee, but do not guarantee a specific teacher or classroom.

Please communicate these concerns in writing to Mr. Lunden by June 1st. Be concise and limit your comments to the following: ~Your child's specific learning style, strengths, or weaknesses; ~A request to not have a teacher an older sibling had; ~Critical information that your child's teacher may not have access to.

Requests for specific teachers will not be accepted and will be returned to parents. Once placements are made and letters are e-mailed, it is very difficult to make any changes. If you have a concern, please do not wait until you receive your placement letter via e-mail. It is much easier to handle special cases early in the process.
