About the Board of Education

The North Syracuse Central School District Board of Education is the official policy-making body of the district. It establishes operational policies, sets educational goals and standards, evaluates program effectiveness, develops the annual school budget and balances educational needs with community resources.

The Board is made up of nine school district residents whose terms are staggered. School district residents elect board members annually during the school district budget vote and Board of Education member election. Board members are not financially compensated for their service. There are three seats per year that are open. Incumbents whose terms expire, must also run for reelection if they wish to remain on the Board of Education.

In addition to the nine board members, a high school senior is appointed annually to serve a one-year term as a non-voting board member. The student member attends all public board meetings and is allowed to participate in all public discussions and voice their opinions. The student does not attend executive or exempt sessions, which are portions of the meeting in which the law allows board members to privately discuss such matters as proposed, pending or current litigation. District residents must reauthorize the position every two years.

- Attend to all accidents and emergencies; and

PHYSICALS

The New York State Department of Education requires a health certificate or health appraisal for every public school student when they: (1) Enter the district for the first time: (2) Are in Grades K, 1, 3, 5, 7, 9 and 11; (3) Participate in interscholastic sports: (4) Need working papers; and/or (5) Are referred to the Committee on Special Education.

All students participating in interscholastic sports programs, regardless of their grade level, must have a physical exam before participating in any sport. This physical includes a health history signed by a parent and blood pressure reading. Physicals must be uploaded into Family ID for approval or turned into the school nurse prior to the start of tryouts. Physicals expire one year from the month they were performed, on the last day of the month.

Pursuant to Education Law, all health examinations performed for school must be documented on the NYS Required Health Examination Form or an equivalent electronic health record form. The form is available on the district website at www.nscsd.org/health.

IMMUNIZATIONS

To prevent communicable disease and to comply with state requirements, all students must be immunized. Students will not be allowed to attend North Syracuse Central Schools without proof of the minimum NYS immunization requirements. Acceptable proof of immunization should be provided in the form of a certificate from a physician or clinic specifying types and dates of immunization or disease, or blood test results that show proof of immunity.

PHOTO AUTHORIZATION

During the school year, your child may have the opportunity to have their photo taken, video image and voice recorded, and/or art and written work published in connection with a district activity or program. Your child's photo (image), school work and/or name may be published in local newspapers, posted (displayed) on the district's internet site, or used by the requesting organization (local TV or print media) for programming, i.e., backup for their news stories. If you DO NOT want your child's picture, name or schoolwork to be used in newspaper articles, video, and/or district publications, including our district website, please inform your school principal in writing.

Transportation

The North Syracuse Central School District uses 140 vehicles to transport approximately 8,000 students to and from school on a daily basis. The district transports students to approximately 50 schools including out-of-district, and non-public or special schools, as required by state law.

Any student who wishes to use district transportation should begin doing so at the beginning of the school year. Once bus routes are finalized during the first weeks of school, there may be no room for students who prefer to walk while the weather is pleasant, but wish to ride during severe winter weather. Parents are notified of their children's bus routes via ParentSquare in the late summer months.

BUS SAFETY & DISCIPLINE

Parents/guardians are responsible for the safety of their children between their residence and the bus stop, as well as at the bus stop. The district is responsible for the safety of students upon entering the school bus, during transportation, and until their discharge from the bus.

Proper behavior is expected from all students and is particularly important when on a school bus. Disruptive, reckless and/or bullying behavior cannot be tolerated on a school bus. Students who are repeatedly disruptive, or who behave recklessly on the bus, will be referred to the appropriate administrator for disciplinary action. This action may include temporary or permanent suspension from the school bus. Please refer to your child's student handbook for more details.

PRIVATE & PAROCHIAL SCHOOLS OUTSIDE THE SCHOOL DISTRICT

Students attending private or parochial schools located outside the district, who have filed an appropriate application, will receive notification from the Transportation Department. The information will contain their bus number, bus stop location, time of pick up and transfer bus, if needed. The school transfer point will be located at the District Office. Any parent who has any questions or does not receive notification should contact the Transportation Department via the Bus Hotline at 315/218-2035 (Aug. 20 through Sept. 13 only).

SCHOOL BUS INFORMATION FOR PRE-K STUDENTS

Parents or guardians of pre-k students will receive notification of bus number, bus stop location, pick-up time and return bus number. This letter should be received by Aug. 25. It should be noted that during the morning run, pre-k students will be at stops with students riding in for K-4 classes.

Please note that only students currently 4 years old can ride the bus to and from schools. Parents must transport students who are not 4 years old to school. If you have any questions, please contact the Transportation Department's Bus Hotline at 315/218-2035 (Aug. 20 through Sept. 13 only).

AS THE NEW SCHOOL YEAR IS ABOUT TO BEGIN, PLEASE REVIEW WITH YOUR CHILDREN THE BASIC RULES OF BUS SAFETY:

- Wait for the bus to come to a complete stop before entering/exiting.
- Stay seated to avoid falling when the bus is moving.
- At the bus stop, wait for the driver to signal to cross the street.
- Do not hook charms, key chains or stuffed animals to backpacks. These items can easily get caught on the bus railing, steps or door.
- ❷ Be sure backpack straps and sweatshirt or jacket strings are tied and in place. These can also easily get caught on the bus railing, steps or door.
- Never get off at a stop that isn't yours unless you have a bus pass to go to someone else's home.
- If you have a question about your stop or forgot to get off at your stop, tell the driver and he/she will get you home safely.
- Elementary students should have bus tags with name, address, phone and bus number visible during the first month of school.

TRANSPORTATION TO AND FROM A CHILD CARE PROVIDER

Parents who require their child to be transported to or from school to a baby sitter or child care provider must complete a set of transportation request forms. Transportation will be arranged to and from the baby sitter. It is the district's expectation that your child utilize the service provided both in the a.m. and p.m. These forms must be updated annually. The district requires that both the parent and the babysitter/child care provider complete a form. These request forms are available through the District Registrar (315/218-2145) or Transportation Department (315/218-2107). Any changes in transportation require a minimum notification of 72 hours. Forms must be on file with the Transportation Department by Aug. 30 or changes will not occur until Sept. 16.

PROHIBITED ITEMS

Any items that may constitute a safety hazard to the driver and passengers are prohibited on a school bus. Such items include weapons. laser pens, lighters, matches, flame starters. bomb bags, etc. Students are not permitted to board the school bus with large objects that take up space needed by fellow passengers. Examples include skis, hockey sticks, skate boards, large musical instruments and large sports bags. Students are permitted to use cell phones while on the school bus, however, use of the cell phone camera or video functions are not permitted at any time while on the school bus. The school bus driver has the authority to suspend cell phone use while on the bus if such use obstructs the safe and proficient operation of the school bus.

Student Dress Code

(Excerpted from Student Code of Conduct, Policy 5311.1)

As students grow and develop their identities, they often use clothing as a way to express themselves. NSCSD respects our students' rights to express their individuality in their appearance while in school and



at school events. Student dress should contribute towards a safe, comfortable, and inclusive learning environment. This policy is intended to communicate student dress code expectations.

Religious and cultural headwear is allowed and accepted in all settings.

MUST WEAR: clothing including both a shirt with pants, shorts, or skirt, or the equivalent and shoes appropriate for coursework. Clothing must cover undergarments (waistbands and bra straps excluded).

MAY WEAR:

- athletic attire, yoga pants, jeggings, distressed jeans, cropped shirts, tank tops
- Hats, bandanas, and/or hoods may be worn in the classroom provided they do not interfere with the line of sight for any student or staff and the classroom teacher provides consent

MAY NOT WEAR: Hats and hoods may not be worn in hallways, lunchrooms, or the auditorium. Student may not wear clothing, items, or accessories that:

- conceal/disguise a student's identity (except for a religious purpose)
- depict, advertise, or imply profanity
- advocate violence, vulgarity, hate speech
- feature pornographic images
- promote drugs, alcohol, and tobacco

- consist of undergarments or bathing suits as outerwear
- denigrate another person's race, color, religion, ancestry, national origin, gender, sexual orientation, gender identity, disability or any other legally protected status
- are see-through and expose undergarments and/or private parts



ADDRESSING VIOLATIONS:

- A staff member will have a supportive, private conversation outside of the classroom setting with a student in violation of the dress code.
- If the student modifies their attire to comply with the dress code, the child is released to class with no disciplinary consequences.
- If a student fails to adjust their attire to comply with the dress code policy, parents will be contacted to have a solution-oriented conversation with the goal of having the student return to their learning environment.
- ✓ If all measures outlined above are not productive, the student will be considered insubordinate and subject to the student code of conduct.

This dress code applies not only to all school instructional programs, but also to all cocurricular, athletic, and extra-curricular activities, clubs, teams and events, including any fund-raising events associated with the school district.

Food Services/School Meal Program



Meals will be free to all students this year

For the 2024-2025 school year, free school breakfast and lunch meals will be provided to all students in the NSCSD through the USDA Community Eligibility Provision (CEP) Program. Students will receive one free breakfast and lunch daily and may purchase extras with their meal account. The NSCSD is committed to ensuring that every child has access to healthy and nutritious meals.

ENROLLMENT IS EASY!

Any child with a food or milk allergy must submit a doctor's note to the school nurse. Children with milk allergies will be provided with Lactaid unless otherwise directed by the doctor.

ENGLISH AS A NEW LANGUAGE (ENL) PROGRAM

It is the responsibility of the North Syracuse Central School District to identify students with limited English proficiency (LEP), to provide sufficient instructional and support services to ensure that all state standards are met, and to provide equal educational opportunities for LEP students to participate in all school programs and extra-curricular activities.

All students who utilize English as a New Language, will be screened to determine if they qualify as Limited English Proficiency students.

Eligible students will be provided with an ENL program, which is sensitive to the first languages and cultures of the students.

Students of Limited English Proficiency who are suspected of having a handicapping condition will be referred to the Language Proficiency Team followed by the Committee on Special Education, in accordance with the Commissioner's Regulations, Part 200.

The district will hold regular meetings at least twice a year for parents/guardians of English learners. At those meetings, parents will be provided with information to help understand the goals of the student's program.

Report Cards and Reporting Procedures

GRADES K-4: For grades K-4, the school year is divided into three trimesters, with approximately 14 weeks in each trimester. Grade K-4 student report cards will be available online through SchoolTool at the end of each trimester. Exact dates for report cards are listed on this calendar and in student and parent handbooks for each school. Parents and guardians should always check the online calendar at www.nscsd.org/calendar for updates to the published calendar.

grades 5-12: For grades 5-12, the school year is divided into four quarters, with approximately ten weeks in each quarter. Grades 5-12 student report cards will be available online through SchoolTool at the end of each quarter to indicate to the student and parents how the student is performing. Exact dates for online reports are listed on this calendar and in student and parent handbooks for each school. Also for students in grades 5-12, during each five-week mid-quarter period, caution/progress reports will be available online on an individual basis for students with a grade of 65 or below, or who have dropped ten points.

INTERSCHOLASTIC ELIGIBILITY: For students in grades 7-12 who participate in interscholastic, co-curricular activities and clubs, an overall average of 70% must be reached in the previous quarter, with not more than one failing course. Throughout the school year, eligibility will be determined quarter by quarter. For example, eligibility for winter activities will be determined by the first quarter

grades (in November); eligibility for spring activities will be determined by the second quarter grades (in February); eligibility for fall activities will be determined by fourth quarter grades (in June) of the previous school year. For complete eligibility criteria, see North Syracuse Central School District Board of Education Policy 5200.

SCHOOLTOOL FOR ONLINE GRADES AND REPORT CARDS

The North Syracuse Central School District utilizes SchoolTool for student report cards and progress reports. To access SchoolTool online, go to https://cnyric02.schooltool.com/cns/.

Parents of newly enrolled students who have provided the district with an email address will be sent a password allowing them to set up a portal account and securely view their student's information. Passwords for new parent accounts will be sent prior to the start of school. If you do not receive a password for your parent account or if you need to have the password for a parent account reset, please contact the building secretary at your child(ren)'s school.

Make sure your contact and personal information is up-to-date by filling out your student's information forms at the beginning of the school year and calling the school with updates. ParentSquare and Peachjar pull parent/guardian information from SchoolTool to send messages.



ATTENDANCE

Regular class attendance is one of the most important aspects of a student's educational program. The educational process requires continuity of instruction and active classroom participation. According to Board of Education Policy 5100.1 on comprehensive attendance, children who turn six years of age during the school year are required to attend school at the start of classes in September. Also, students who turn 16 during a school year continue to be subject to the compulsory education laws through the end of that school year. The North Syracuse Central School District Board of Education strongly believes that daily classroom attendance is an important aspect of a student's educational program.

While we want all our students and teachers in school as much as possible, we want to stress the importance of attending school only when feeling healthy.

Within the meaning of the education law, excused absences are for illness or injury, medical or dental appointments, family emergencies, death or religious holidays. Upon returning to school students must present a written explanation relative to their absence, including the specific dates they were out, to their teacher or attendance office.

Chronic truancy problems are reported to Onondaga Family Court and the student may be adjudicated as a "Person in Need of Supervision" (PINS).

Early Education Programs

NORTH SYRACUSE EARLY EDUCATION PROGRAM (NSEEP)

The North Syracuse Early Education Program offers an inclusive preschool program for three and four year-old students. Children with special needs participate in a child-centered and socially stimulating learning experience with their preschool peers. The North Syracuse Early Education Program is located at 205 South Main Street in North Syracuse.



The preschool program serves children in full and half day classrooms. Certified teachers strive to provide a developmentally appropriate, language-rich curriculum in an integrated setting.

ELEMENTARY EDUCATION PROGRAM

Students in kindergarten to fourth grade attend school in one of our six elementary buildings. Entering kindergartners must be 5 years of age on or before Dec. 1 to register. Proof of age, proof of residency and immunization records must be verified at the time of registration. Kindergarten registration is completed at each school during selected dates in the months of March and April.

The North Syracuse CSD utilizes a comprehensive language arts curriculum for students in grade K-4. We explicitly teach foundational skills in reading, writing, speaking and listening through content rich



curriculum that builds student background knowledge and vocabulary using a structured literacy approach that is backed by the science of reading. For further information on these programs, contact the Director of Elementary Education and ELA at 315/218-2153.

UNIVERSAL PREKINDERGARTEN

Universal Prekindergarten (UPK) is a state and federally funded prekindergarten program available to all four year old children in the North Syracuse Central School District. The UPK program is free to district residents, regardless of income, and is an excellent way to expose your child to the school setting and prepare your child for entering kindergarten. When schools are closed because of weather conditions or other emergencies, announcements are sent through ParentSquare and posted on the district website (www.nscsd.org). The district also contacts local news media to share this information but parents and guardians should always rely on the district website for the most up-to-date information.

In order to ensure that your child will be properly cared for if no one is at home, please make arrangements at the beginning of the school year so that your child will be assured shelter upon arriving home. Be sure to carefully explain all of these arrangements to your child.

PARENTSOUARE

The district uses ParentSquare to notify parents, guardians and staff of emergency school closings, delays and early dismissals. The system sends automated notifications based on user preferences. If parents or guardians need to update an email address or phone number, they should contact the main office of their child's school.

Grandparents, babysitters and community members can sign up to receive emergency notifications by going to https://www.parentsquare.com/community_signups/c20fecde-1b97-4e1b-9d37-ac66a49208ac/new, providing a name and email address and clicking the "Emergency Alerts" category.

NEWS MEDIA

The district notifies local news media of closings, delays and event cancellations as a backup to notifications and website announcements. We recommend first checking the district website and then multiple media sources when it comes to weather-related announcements. This is particularly true in situations that involve power outages, which can impact the district's ability to send electronic notifications.

The following local TV and radio stations are typically notified of emergency communications for North Syracuse Central School District: Spectrum News (Channel 10), WSTM/WTVH (TV 3/5), WSYR 9 (TV 9) and 570 WSYR (AM Radio).

STUDENT TRANSPORTATION

Please be sure to complete and update your child's emergency form and update it when necessary. Your child's school must know where they should go in the event of an early dismissal.

BREAKFAST SERVICE DURING DELAYS

During 2-hour delayed openings school breakfast WILL NOT be served and families should ensure that their child eats before arriving at school.

YMCA CHILDCARE AT ELEMENTARY SCHOOLS

In the event that after school activities are canceled, YMCA childcare programs at NSCSD elementary schools have permission to remain open. In the event of an early dismissal/school closure, all buildings in the NSCSD must be closed and YMCA programs are also canceled at the same determined time. It is recommended that parents with children in a YMCA program check directly with the organization with any questions.



When there is inclement or forecasted inclement weather, the decision to close school, delay opening or dismiss early is based on travel conditions and weather predictions to ensure the safety of all students and staff.

Academic Intervention Services

Academic Intervention Services (AIS) are services designed to help students achieve the learning standards in English language arts and math in grades 1-12 and social studies and science in grades 10-12. These are services needed to address barriers to improved academic performance and/or additional instruction that supplements regular classroom instruction.

Students who meet the criteria on the North Syracuse Central School District's adopted norm referenced test and/ or score below the state determined proficiency level on the New York State Assessments, may be eligible to receive Academic Intervention Services. State assessments are given in English Language Arts and Mathematics in third through eighth grades. At the high school level, students who do not pass NYS Regents examinations may also be eligible for Academic Intervention Services.

Career Education

Career Education Centers are located at both the North Syracuse Junior High School and Cicero-North Syracuse High School. The program's goal is to provide 8th through 12th grade students with subject matter and workforce preparation skills that will prepare them for post-secondary studies and/or gainful employment in a career field of interest to them while nurturing a lifelong-learning attitude.

At the North Syracuse Junior High School students will begin their career exploration/life skills journey in collaboration with the Family & Consumer Science department along with an introduction to employability skills. Cicero-North Syracuse High School students also have the option to participate in job shadows, interactive workshops and the ASVAB Career Exploration Assessment program. The Career Exploration Internship Program (CEIP) is a credit earning course and is available to juniors/seniors through the Business Department.

BOCES Occupational Education

Students enrolled in the Occupational Education Program in the North Syracuse Central School District have the opportunity to enhance their learning by completing their training with the advanced programs offered through Onondaga-Cortland-Madison (OCM) BOCES at their occupational centers. Occupational education sequences at Cicero-North Syracuse High School are offered in conjunction with those programs available at the OCM BOCES centers.

OCM BOCES programs are either one or two-year sequences, open to any 11th and 12th grade student with a variety of courses available. In addition, the OCM BOCES New Vision Program offers 12th grade students the opportunity to participate in a variety of career fields (e.g., criminal justice, physical therapy, environmental sciences, medical professions, etc.). Students attend half-day sessions, either in the morning or the afternoon, and busing is provided for students taking courses at any of the OCM BOCES centers.

Upon completion of the application, the school nurse issues the working papers. Paper forms needed for working papers can also be obtained in the nurse's office.

Student Assessments

The North Syracuse Central School District has a comprehensive pupil assessment program. The present program includes both state-mandated pupil and program evaluation tests, standardized tests, and end-of-course or final examinations. Testing is only one tool that is used to evaluate children and guide them into the best educational program to meet their instructional needs.

NY STATE ASSESSMENTS:

- Grade 5 Science
- Grade 8 Science

NY State Assessment dates are posted on the district's online calendar at www.nscsd.org/calendar.

These assessments measure minimum competency skills based on updated curriculum standards. These scores indicate whether a pupil meets or exceeds the state minimum requirements in the basic skills for that particular grade level. Pupils scoring below the state minimum must be provided academic intervention services.

REGENTS EXAMINATIONS:

All students will be expected to pass Regents Examinations with a grade of 65 or higher in English, Integrated Algebra, Social Studies and Science to receive a Regents diploma.

GED/TASC (GENERAL EQUIVALENCY DIPLOMA)

The district contracts with OCM BOCES for General Equivalency Diploma programs designed to give students and adults (ages 16 and older) who did not complete high school an opportunity to earn their high school diplomas. Students do not have to pay any fees to participate in this program.

The program for 16 and 17 year olds is conducted at BOCES. Classes are held Monday through Friday, either 8:30 a.m. to 11:30 a.m. or 12:00 p.m. to 3:00 p.m. Students must be referred to the program through their high school counselor. To be eligible, students must complete an application form, meet with a school representative and be 16 years old prior to July 1st.

The GED Preparation Program for students age 18 and older is also offered by OCM BOCES. The student must complete a registration application at BOCES. Contact the OCM BOCES Program Coordinator with questions regarding their GED program at 315/453-4672.

The State Education Department maintains a Hotline (1-518-474-5906) for any questions regarding GED preparation programs, testing dates, or eligibility requirements. Email inquiries can also be sent to hse@nysed.gov.

School Budget Vote

In New York state, local school boards must develop a balanced school budget proposal and put it up for a public vote each year. That vote is typically held on the third Tuesday of May. School districts are primarily funded by state aid and local property taxes and their budgets pay for everyone and everything that make education possible.

Like other school districts, the NSCSD begins budget discussions in the fall and works throughout the school year to develop a balanced budget proposal aligned with priorities and resources. District residents are encouraged to learn more about the budget process and the importance of voting by going to www.nscsd.org/budget.

Voting Qualifications for School Budget Vote and BOE Member Election

Voters must be...

- 18 years of age or older
- A District resident 30 days prior to a vote
- A United States citizen
- Not under sentence for a felony conviction and not adjudged mentally incompetent
- Registered with Onondaga County or the North Syracuse Central School District

The NSCSD has registration and polling locations at Cicero-North Syracuse High School and the Administrative Office Building. Graduation Requirements

Currently, a student must earn 22 units for a high school diploma. This includes two full units of physical education for four years. All students in grades 9-11 must carry at least six classes per semester in addition to physical education. In order to meet the 22 units of credit that are required for graduation, all students must carry a minimum of 6.5 credits, which include special education assignments and AIS placement, for the year.

To qualify for a Regents Diploma, students must pass Regents Common Core exams with a 65 in English, Social Studies, Math and Science. A total of 22 units is currently required for graduation from Cicero-North Syracuse High School.

NOTE: Students seeking a Regents Diploma, who pursue a 5-unit sequence in Art, Business, FACS, Music, Technology or Occupational Education, may be exempted from the second language requirement. Students are eligible for a Regents Diploma with Advanced Designation who, in addition to the minimum of 5 regents above, also take two additional regents in math and one additional regents in science.

COLLEGE PROGRAMS

The North Syracuse Central School District presently participates in the College Board's Advanced Placement Program, World Languages through Adelphi University and SUNY Oswego, Project Lead the Way through RIT, SU Project Advance, Interior Design through SUNY Oneonta and Clothing Production through SUNY Oneonta and Foundations for College & Career Success through Onondaga Community College.

Summer Programs

The North Syracuse Central School District, through the auspices of the Onondaga-Cortland-Madison (OCM) BOCES, offers secondary summer school programs to students in grades 7-8 and 9-12. Alternative Instruction

HOMEBOUND INSTRUCTION

Homebound Instruction is an educational alternative provided to students in grades K-12 who, due to serious medical or emotional illness, are unable to attend their educational programs for an extended period of time. The student's attending physician submits a request for this service to the district. The request must include a complete outline of the student's medical/emotional condition as well as the length of time (4-6 week minimum) the student will be out of school and a plan for the student to re-enter school. PARENT INSTRUCTION/HOME INSTRUCTION

Parent instruction, or home schooling, allows parents an opportunity to provide a tailored educational program within their home environment. The parent is responsible for delivering the entire program as the child's teacher. EDUCATIONALLY RELATED SUPPORT SERVICES PROGRAM

This service is designed to provide short-term counseling for students in grades K-4 who are experiencing difficulties in school.

SCHOOL COUNSELING SERVICES



Beginning with 7th grade, students are assigned a school counselor. School counselors are available to help students in many areas, including: course

selection and scheduling, study skills, classroom concerns, long-term educational or vocational planning, college application processes and personal adjustment. Students are encouraged to make appointments to see their counselors.

The school counselor is also available to assist parents in determining the level of achievement that should be expected from his/her child and to address the needs of students who have academic problems. The counselor will conduct an annual meeting, at which time the student's courses will be selected for the next school year and academic progress will be reviewed. For questions or concerns about counseling services, visit the "Wellness" button on the NSCSD website.

STUDENT ASSISTANCE COUNSELING

The Student Assistance Counseling program is a counseling service designed to help troubled adolescents, grades 8-12, through early intervention. This service is a partnership with Contact Community Services and the district. Student assistance counselors work with students, staff and families to provide support, assessment, referral, information and student counseling. Contact your school counselor or principal.

SOCIAL WORK SERVICES AND SUPPORTS

The primary aim of the school social worker is to provide support, intervention and counseling to students and their families in grades K-12 with regard to any situation that is adversely affecting the student's ability to function and benefit from his/her educational program. Students and families may be referred by the school social worker to various community agencies for more comprehensive and/or intensive services. 
ALCOHOL-DRUG ABUSE PREVENTION & EDUCATION PROGRAM (ADA-PEP)

Bill of Rights for Data Privacy and Security

Data Security and Privacy Protection of Student, Teacher, and Principal Personal Information (BOE Policy 4202.3)

It is the North Syracuse Central School
District's responsibility to adopt appropriate
administrative, technical, and physical
safeguards and controls to protect and maintain
the confidentiality, integrity and availability
of its data, data systems and information
technology resources. All stakeholders,
including students, teachers and administrators
should be aware of their rights and expect their
data to be kept private and confidential.

In order to provide a successful educational program, the North Syracuse Central School District receives, creates, archives, and transfers sensitive, private information about students, teachers, and principals protected by both state and federal law. The North Syracuse Central School District takes active measures to protect confidential information in compliance with all state and federal laws. The district expects all employees and partners to maintain the confidentiality of protected information in compliance with state and federal law and applicable board policies.

SUPPLEMENTAL INFORMATION REGARDING THIRD PARTY CONTRACTORS

Any and all contracts between the North Syracuse Central School District and third-party contractors, under which a contractor will receive student data or principal or teacher data, shall include provisions requiring that the contractor maintain the confidentiality of shared student data or teacher or principal data in accordance with law, regulation and district policy. In addition, the district will ensure that the contract or written agreement with a third party contractor includes a signed copy of the Bill of Rights and the contractor's privacy and security plan, in compliance with Part 121 of the Commissioner's regulations.

COMPLAINTS

Any parent/guardian, eligible student, teacher, principal or other eligible staff may file a complaint regarding a breach or unauthorized release of student data and/or teacher/principal APPR data by filing a written complaint with the district's Data Protection Officer.

DATA PRIVACY AND PROTECTION

Education Law 2-D is a New York State law requiring school districts to take significant measures to secure and protect the personally identifiable information (PII) of students, classroom teachers, and building principals. The district provides annual training for all employees who have access to protected data.

Students, staff, and parents representing the North Syracuse Central School District are year-round role models.

Program participation enriches the educational experience, promotes connectedness, and a sense of belonging, and contributes to the development of a well-rounded student. The culture of the NSCSD is also reflected in what occurs before and after the normal academic day. We strive to balance individual talent with group achievement, where student and program development define success. While the reputation of our school and community is enhanced whenever its representatives excel, by far the greatest rewards and satisfactions are derived through participation in our athletic opportunities.









National Honor Society

The C-NS Chapter of the National Honor Society (NHS) offers membership to students in grades eleven and twelve who have already exhibited academic achievement with a weighted grade point average (GPA) of 89.5 or higher, as well as leadership, and honorable and admirable character. Additionally, they have demonstrated that they are willing to use their talents and skills for the improvement of society through their volunteer service. Invitations to be considered for membership are mailed home, and students respond within a set amount of time by completing an application for membership.

Faculty members serve as the Faculty Council and review each student's application, along with faculty input, to determine whether a candidate meets the leadership, service and character criteria as outlined in the National Honor Society Handbook. Commencing with their official NHS acceptance letter, all members must follow the NHS Code of Conduct and read and follow the procedures outlined in the current C-NS Parent-Student Handbook. It is considered a privilege and not a right to represent the C-NS Chapter of the National Honor Society and uphold its high standards of character and behavior.

Once inducted, members are required to complete two group projects and 10 hours of individual community service while supporting the numerous Chapter fund-raising and service projects each year. A one-time membership fee of \$20 is collected. Students must accept responsibility for upholding the high standards that accompany membership in their local NHS Chapter or be subject to disciplinary action by the Faculty Council.



National Junior Honor Society

Selection to the National Junior Honor Society is a privilege. Students do not apply for membership into the National Junior Honor Society. Instead, they provide information to be used by the Faculty Council for review. Members will be selected on the basis of scholarship, leadership, service, character and citizenship. Membership to the Elizabeth F. Glies Chapter of the National Junior Honor Society is granted to those students who meet all requirements established by the constitution and by the Faculty Council.

Students in eighth and ninth grade, who earn an overall average of 90 or better and have attended North Syracuse Junior High School in the first two marking periods, will receive a packet of National Junior Honor Society "Student Activity Informational Forms" in homeroom

during the week that report cards go out for the 2nd quarter. Students who do not receive the informational forms and believe they have met the grade requirements should bring their report card to the National Junior Honor Society Advisor.

Once inducted, members are required to meet monthly and complete service projects throughout the year. North Syracuse Junior High School has a partnership with KWS Bear Road Elementary School and the North Syracuse Early Education Program to visit the schools monthly and work with students on reading, mathematics and other educational skills. The National Junior Honor Society also contributes to the Vera House White Ribbon Campaign and towards the Dollars for Scholars Bowl-a-Thon and Phone-a-Thon.

USE OF SCHOOL FACILITIES

It is the belief of the North Syracuse Central School District Board of Education that the schools belong to the public and should be used as much as possible, as long as usage does not interfere with the educational programs of the district. Facilities may be used by nonprofit organizations in the community for a nominal fee representing the district's direct cost to operate the facilities while in use by the public.

All groups interested in using a school's facilities must complete an online application. The application can be found on the district website (www.nscsd.org) under District/Facilities/Facility Use. The page provides detailed instructions on how to complete a formal application. Applicants will need to complete their online application at least two weeks prior to the date being requested.

District-Wide Safety Plan

The North Syracuse Central District has a District-Wide Safety Plan in place to address student and staff safety issues. The plan would be activated in the event of a local disaster or school emergency.

Statistics show schools are still among the safest places to be on a day-to-day basis, due to the strong commitment of educators, parents and communities to their children. Nevertheless, disasters do happen and, because of that, no community can be complacent in its efforts to make its schools even safer.

As part of its District-Wide Safety Plan, the district has a designated chief emergency officer who is responsible for coordinating communication between staff, law enforcement and first responders to ensure staff understanding of the district-level safety plan. The chief emergency officer will also be responsible for communicating details to staff during an emergency.

Also in the event of an emergency, the district's school information officer will be responsible for disseminating information to the public by communicating with local media and the community. Several communication methods are available to the district and will be utilized as appropriate. Such methods include text, email and telephone alerts, website updates, social media messages and media announcements.

The district's mass communication system, ParentSquare, utilizes the student/parent/guardian information stored in SchoolTool. Therefore, it is imperative that parents and guardians ensure that their contact information is correct in SchoolTool. Whenever your contact information changes, be sure to contact your child's school immediately to update your information to ensure that you receive emergency communications from the district. If a student's home address changes, please contact the district's registration office at 315/218-2145.

EMERGENCY RESPONSE PLANS

The District-Wide Safety Plan is directly linked to individual building-level Emergency Response Plans for each school. Protocols reflected in the District-Wide Safety Plan guide the development and implementation of individual Building-level Emergency Response Plans. All information pertaining to an emergency or violent incident will be directed to either the building principal or designee. Upon the activation of Building-Level Emergency Response procedures, the Superintendent of Schools or his/her designee is notified and, where appropriate, local emergency officials are also notified. The Building-Level Emergency Response Teams are activated to support an appropriate response to an emergency and play a central role in overall planning for responses to emergencies at the building level. Efforts may be supplemented by County and State resources through existing protocols when needed.



DRILLS

The district will provide parents and guardians with advanced notice of emergency drills. NSCSD Schools will send such notification via the Parent Square app up to (7) seven days ahead of each emergency drill. All drills are performed in a trauma informed manner. meaning that we avoid the use of props. actors or simulations in an effort to avoid triggering negative emotional or psychological responses in participating staff or students. With the exception of fire drills which are required to be initiated from a pull station, all district drills are clearly announced (ie. "This is a drill....). Lockdown drills are supported by our School Resource Officers (SRO's) and their departments, this practice ensures that our building administrators and our local law enforcement teams are familiar with one another and prepared to work effectively together.
