# Proposed 2017-18 Budget Honors District's Mission and Vision

On April 10, 2017 the North Syracuse Central School District Board of Education adopted a \$158,690,480 budget proposal for the 2017-18 school year. The proposed budget will be voted on by district residents on May 16.

North Syracuse Central School District Superintendent of Schools Annette Speach said, "The proposed budget clearly honors our district's mission and works toward the collective vision developed through community input."

Despite efforts to encourage law makers to pay the district the Foundation Aid it is entitled to, the district will receive over \$8.2 million less this year than is required by law.

The Foundation Aid formula distributes funds to school districts based on the cost of providing a sound basic education. In light of Foundation Aid shortfalls and the desire to not increase local school taxes above the tax cap, the district made the decision to balance its budget by using a portion of its fund balance.

# Feedback consistent in second annual survey

For the second year in a row, this January and February, the North Syracuse Central School District administered a survey to gather feedback from members of the community to help assess progress and set goals for the district. Just over 1,000 participants responded to this year's survey, answering various questions about climate, academics, communications, safety, homework & reporting, engagement, responsiveness and quality & satisfaction for individual schools and the district as a whole.

Superintendent of Schools Annette Speach said, "We are in the process of comparing this year's results to 2016. While our participation declined from last year's 1,806, our preliminary results are similar. We hope to increase participation in subsequent years and especially would like to see continued improvement in our satisfaction levels."

Again this year, feedback showed the overwhelming majority of respondents were satisfied in all categories.

"We're pleased to now have two years of data," said Superintendent Speach. "Doing this survey annually allows us to see how we are doing and provides us with comparative data over time. This feedback from the community is critical as we strive to work together to meet the needs of all of our students."

State law limits a school district's fund balance to no more than 4% of their total budget. The North Syracuse Central School District's fund balance will be approximately 3% as of June 30, 2017.

"By restoring a portion of the co-curricular clubs (*NSJHS Science Olympiad participants pictured above*) and athletic teams that were cut in 2009, we are truly able to provide educational experiences and opportunities that inspire students to reach their individual potential as productive citizens," said Superintendent Speach.

"In addition, the visioning work that was recently done throughout our school community clearly establishes our hope to honor diversity, differentiation and to provide collaborative instructional spaces to enhance learning," she continued.

The addition of staffing to enhance the district's more inclusive model of providing services to North Syracuse Central School District special needs students also speaks to this and is incorporated into the 2017-18 proposed budget.

"Utilizing fund balance to support the budget is not a sustainable approach in the long-run," said Donald F.X. Keegan, North Syracuse Central School District's Associate Superintendent for Business Services.

"We will be continuing our efforts to stress to our legislators and the governor that the Foundation Aid issue must be revisited in order to provide a sound basic education for our students," he added.

Superintendent Speach expressed the proposed budget's fiscal responsibility saying, "Our district continues to develop budgets that stay within the expected tax cap for our local community. And by honoring our mission and vision, we are demonstrating our commitment to keep the needs of our students in the forefront."



## Eight teachers awarded NSEF grants to enhance programming

Eight North Syracuse Central School District teachers are being recognized for receiving grants from the North Syracuse Education Foundation (NSEF) in their 2017 Grant Award's Program. NSEF resources support quality education through creative opportunities, and innovative/imaginative approaches.

Since 2003, NSEF has provided nearly \$100,000 in grant money for student programming through generous contributions from the community.

# WANT TO CHANGE YOUR CONTACT SETTINGS?



The North Syracuse Central School District uses the SchoolMessenger InfoCenter to help parents/guardians and staff manage automated messages. YOU can now manage the way you receive phone calls, text messages and emails from the district.

#### Sign-up for the free online system by going to

www.nscsd.org/NSCSDinfocenter and clicking the sign-up link at the top right of the screen. To use InfoCenter on your mobile device, download the free "SchoolMessenger InfoCenter" app by going to the App Store or Google Play on your mobile device.

Sign-up, using the email address you have on file with your child(ren)'s school and create a password. You will receive a confirmation email at the address you entered. Be sure to check your "junk" or "SPAM" folders for the email. If you are unable to complete this step because the system does not recognize the email address you entered, the district may have an incorrect email address on file for you. Please check with your child(ren)'s school to make sure your email address is correct.

Once you receive your confirmation email and click on that link, you will be signed-up for InfoCenter and can log in with the password you created. Please be sure to keep your password secure and available for future reference.

Once you are signed into InfoCenter, you will have the option of changing the way that you receive messages in the preferences section. If you have not received text messages from the district in the past, simply text the word "YES" to 67587 to opt into the service. For details about the alert types that the district uses, visit their "Communications" website at www.nscsd.org/communications. The system cannot be used to CHANGE contact information such as incorrect phone numbers/email addresses. You must contact your child(ren)'s school to make those changes.

Please note: If multiple people (mom and dad) in the same household, listed the same home telephone number on their child(ren)'s student data form, BOTH people need to sign-up for InfoCenter and modify their call settings for the home phone number if they do not want to receive calls.

#### SCHOOL BOARD CANDIDATES

The Board of Education is the official policy-making body of the North Syracuse Central School District. The Board is composed of nine members who are elected by District voters to three-year terms. Members receive no salary for serving on the Board. The terms of three Board members expire each June 30<sup>th</sup>. Board members may seek re-election at the annual budget vote. This year there are four candidates running for three vacant seats due to the expiration of terms. The three candidates receiving the highest number of votes will be elected to three (3) year terms (from July 1, 2017 to June 30, 2020).



**Elizabeth A. Kasch** is seeking reelection for her second term on the Board of Education. She has lived in the district for the past 19 years, currently residing in Liverpool with her husband Mike and their three children.

Ms. Kasch works as a substitute teaching assistant for the Onondaga Cortland Madison Board of Cooperative Educational Services (OCM BOCES), where she assists in the provision of academic and behavioral support

services to autistic students.

Ms. Kasch is involved with various committees and special projects in the district including Parents Advisory Council, the Board's Executive Committee and Budget Sub-Committee. She also co-chairs the Legislative Committee and is involved with the district's baseball and softball booster clubs, special education committee and C-NS's Green Closet.

She holds a bachelor's degree in psychology and a master's degree in drug & alcohol counseling and is part of the women's ministry at Northside Baptist Church. ★



**Erin C. McDonald** is seeking election for her first term on the North Syracuse Central School District Board of Education. She has lived within the district for nearly 30 years. She currently resides in her childhood home in Clay with her mother, Kay McDonald, a retired teacher from the North Syracuse Central School District.

## VEHICLE PURCHASE REFERENDUM

On May 16, the North Syracuse Central School District will be asking voters to decide upon the purchase of several new vehicles.

Each year, all school buses must pass a rigorous state inspection. Replacement of buses normally occurs after 10 years when it is no longer cost-effective to meet those standards.

The 2017-18 vehicle proposition includes the following purchases at a total cost not to exceed \$1,557,334:

- ten new 65-passenger diesel school buses;
- one new 42-passenger diesel school bus with one to three wheelchair positions, hydraulic lift and air conditioning;
- one new 48-passenger bus with air conditioning and
