Budget priorities align with VISION 2020: BRIGHTER TOGETHER

On April 2, 2018 the North Syracuse Central School District Board of Education adopted a \$163,200,980 budget proposal for the 2018-19 school year. The proposed budget will be voted on by district residents on May 15.

The budget proposal demonstrates the district's commitment to student success by providing enhanced opportunities that align with *Vision2020: Brighter Together.*

Vision2020 provides a road map to move the district forward in its mission of providing educational experiences and opportunities that inspire students to reach their individual potential as productive citizens. *Vision 2020* and our areas of focus remained the priority as decisions were made in terms of where to best allocate resources.

The work that the community has done over the last few years to develop our mission and vision has provided a focus. This budget allows this work to come to life.

Budget at-a-glance

Proposed budget \$163,200,980 Tax Levy increase \$2,505,330

Proposed school tax levy increase at tax cap = 2.94%

The proposed budget includes a net increase of six positions to support *Vision2020*'s eight focus areas. This includes expanded course offerings at Cicero-North Syracuse High School, special needs inclusion, English Language Learners and an additional School Psychologist to address the social emotional needs of our students.

Additional electives at the high school will result in seniors taking advantage of opportunities to further determine their areas of interest that may lead to college and career choices, as well as increasing the level of rigor that colleges are seeking.

I want to thank our administration and Board of Education for their hard work on this year's proposal. I believe that *Vision2020:Brighter Together* is well supported here and that the taxpayers are being asked to support a fiscally-responsible proposal. Your consideration of this proposal is greatly appreciated.

Third annual survey revised to align with Vision2020: Brighter Together

For the third consecutive year, this January and February, the North Syracuse Central School District administered a survey to gather feedback from members of the community to help assess progress and set goals for the district.

Participants may have noticed that some survey questions were worded slightly differently from last year. In order to more closely align questions to *Vision2020: Brighter Together*, district groups met and analyzed the questions in relation to focus areas.

Superintendent of Schools Annette Speach spoke about the changes saying, "For the past few years, we've been asking the

community for their feedback about how we are doing working towards our shared vision and goals. We needed to adjust this year's survey slightly so that we can get a better understanding of our work in relation to *Vision2020*. We are in the process of comparing this year's results to the previous two years," she continued.

While feedback once again this year demonstrates the majority of respondents' satisfaction in all categories, there have been slight declines in the percentages and the district is exploring that feedback. Thank you to everyone that completed the survey.

SCHOOL BOARD CANDIDATES

The Board of Education is the official policy-making body of the North Syracuse Central School District. The Board is composed of nine members who are elected by District voters to three-year terms. Members receive no salary for serving on the Board. The terms of three Board members expire each June 30th. Board members may seek re-election at the annual budget vote.

This year there are five candidates running for three vacant seats due to the expiration of terms. There is an additional vacancy on the Board due to the resignation of a Board member. The three candidates receiving the highest number of votes will be elected to three (3) year terms (from July 1, 2018 to June 30, 2021) and the candidate receiving the fourth highest number of votes will be elected for a one (1) year term (from July 1, 2018 to June 30, 2019) to fill the unexpired term.

Each Board of Education candidate is responsible for providing information for his or her own biography. The district does not endorse one candidate over another and reserves the right to edit biographies for space purposes. Candidate biographies are listed alphabetically on the following page.

Information for Voters

Voter Qualifications: In order to vote in the May 15, 2018 election, you must be a United States citizen, 18 years of age or older and meet the following qualifications:

- ★ A resident of the school district for at least 30 days prior to the vote,
- Not under sentence for a felony conviction and not adjudged mentally incompetent,
- ★ Registered to vote in Onondaga County or the North Syracuse Central School District.

Absentee Ballots

Registration Information: If you are not registered to vote, you must pre-register by May 10, 2018 to vote in the May 15, 2018 election.

When and Where

- Until May 10, 2018 from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m., Monday through Friday at the Jerome F. Melvin Administrative Office Building, 5355 West Taft Road in North Syracuse
- On May 1, 2018 from 4 p.m. to 8 p.m. at Cicero Elementary School, 5979 Route 31 in Cicero and at the Jerome F. Melvin Administrative Office Building, 5355 West Taft Road in North Syracuse

Qualified voters of the District may obtain applications for an absentee ballot from the Office of the District Clerk. Completed applications must be received by the District Clerk no later than 5:00 p.m. on May 14, 2018, if the ballot is to be delivered personally to the voter, and must be received no later than 5:00 p.m. on May 8, 2018 if the absentee ballot is to be mailed to the voter. Completed applications received after 5:00 p.m. on May 8, 2018 will require the voter to personally appear at the Office of the District Clerk to receive an absentee ballot.

Safety and security enhancements

When developing it's 2018-2019 budget proposal, the district included \$100,000 to enhance security in schools district-wide. This funding is consistent with special security initiatives also included in previous years' annual budgets.

The district currently employs eight security guards and three school resource officers (SRO) at secondary buildings. The intent of the SRO program is to bring police closer to our students and staff so they can develop meaningful relationships allowing us to proactively handle situations that may develop within schools.

Superintendent of Schools Annette Speach said, "We are fortunate to have excellent relationships with law enforcement including the Onondaga County Sheriff's Department, Cicero Police, North Syracuse Police and the New York State Troopers. As a large suburban school district, multiple agencies respond to incidents very rapidly."

Part of the district's proactive approach is to maintain a school environment that is welcoming to the community and supportive of students and staff.

Some safety measures currently taking place in the district:

- All buildings are locked during school hours and visitors must access the building through a single point of entry.
- Significant investments have been made in access control and camera surveillance systems.

- Visitors are processed through the Raptor System, requiring them to present identification and wear a sticker identifying them as a visitor.
- Incident management training (pictured below) was conducted for district administrators and staff in July of 2017.

In addition to measures already in place, the district's 2018-2019 budget proposal includes:

- Additional security cameras installed across the district.
- Additional staff training to build upon safety and security trainings that have already taken place. "Active shooter" training is planned for all district staff as part of September 2018 staff development training prior to the start of the school year.
- School building entrances have been, and continue to be remodeled with security in mind.

VEHICLE PURCHASE REFERENDUM

On May 15, the North Syracuse Central School District will be asking voters to decide upon the purchase of several new vehicles.

Each year, all school buses must pass a rigorous state inspection.



Replacement of buses normally occurs after 10 years when it is no longer cost-effective to meet those standards.

The 2018-19 vehicle proposition includes the following purchases at a total cost not to exceed \$1,472,440:

- 12 new 65-passenger diesel school buses;
- one new 42-passenger diesel school bus with one to three wheelchair positions, hydraulic lift and air conditioning;
- one new 48-passenger bus with air conditioning and
- one new delivery truck.
