A Student-Centered Approach to the 2025-26 Budget

Dear North Syracuse Central School District community,

On Tuesday, May 20, residents of the North Syracuse Central School District will vote on a proposed 2025–26 school year budget totaling \$224,048,589. This budget includes a tax levy increase of 2.91%, which is within the allowable cap. While the district continues to face financial pressures, the proposal reflects a strong commitment to students and to the priorities outlined in the district's strategic plan: ensuring every child becomes a proficient reader, building emotional competence, and preparing all graduates for success beyond high school.

One of the most important ways the district supports student achievement is by investing in high-quality curriculum, effective instruction and the daily learning experiences that help students grow academically, socially and emotionally. We've prioritized maintaining small class sizes because we know that personalized attention and strong teacher-student relationships lead to better outcomes. Even amid significant financial challenges—including the loss of more than \$18 million in federal pandemic relief funds (CRRSA and ARP), rising costs and limited state aid increases—NSCSD remains focused on protecting these essential investments. Our commitment to excellent teaching and student-centered learning remains unwavering.

This year's \$100,000 capital outlay project will fund the purchase and installation of acoustic panels in the cafeteria and other large spaces at Roxboro Road Middle School to reduce ambient noise and improve communication and comfort for students and staff.

Reinvigorating the Superintendent's Student Advisory Council (SSAC)

As the North Syracuse Central School District (NSCSD) prepares its 2025-26 budget, a renewed focus is being placed on including student perspectives in the decision-making process. One key way this is happening is through the revitalization of the Superintendent's Student Advisory Council (SSAC).

Dr. Terry L. Ward, who became superintendent in January, is committed to strengthening student voice across the district. He is collaborating with building principals at Gillette Road Middle School, Roxboro Road Middle School, North Syracuse Junior High School and Cicero-North Syracuse High School to ensure diverse student representation on the SSAC and to bring students into conversations about priorities—including those related to the budget.

"Students are the ones who live our decisions every day," said Dr. Ward. "We want to make sure we're investing in what matters most to them, and that starts with listening."

The SSAC serves as a direct line of communication between students and district leadership, allowing students to share input on academic programs, school climate and key initiatives.

Feedback from a recent ThoughtExchange survey confirmed that students have important ideas and care deeply about their schools. The SSAC provides a more consistent way to gather and act on that input throughout the year.

Dr. Ward plans to meet with the advisory council before the end of this school year and will continue those conversations to help drive district priorities for the 2025-26 school year and beyond.

"We are Brighter Together when we treat students as true partners," said Dr. Ward. "The budget isn't just about numbers—it's about values. And our students can help us make sure we're aligning our spending with what they need to succeed."

Building a Brighter Future Together: **Reviewing ThoughtExchange Feedback**

As you know, the NSCSD recently conducted a ThoughtExchange survey asking community members to discuss a change, improvement or initiative they think would have the greatest positive impact. The Exchange brought together a diverse group of voices: 42% teachers and instructional staff, 41% parents and guardians and 18% students and community members.

In our preliminary analysis of the data, several key themes emerged. Common ideas included innovating teaching methods to coincide with evolving student needs, ensuring safe and engaging environments and enhancing communication between our schools and families.

In the next months, we will be taking a deeper dive into the data to develop strategies for using your thoughtful insight to plan improvements aligned with our strategic goals. Dr. Ward will present initial findings to the Board of Education at a meeting later this school year.

Dr. Ward commented on the potential of the tool. He said, "We're excited about using ThoughtExchange to ensure all voices are heard as the district progresses in becoming an exceptional place for all students, staff and families."

In preparation for the next school year, the district's leadership team will be trained to utilize the tool to integrate community feedback into every level of planning and decision-making.

Brighter Together: Northstars are Rising to New Heights

NSCSD continues to provide students with outstanding opportunities to thrive not only in the classroom but also through extracurricular academic, art, music, athletic and other co-curricular activities.

When students feel connected to their school, teachers and the activities they love, they are more likely to succeed. These meaningful connections support our district's top strategic goal: improving high school graduation rates and preparing students for success beyond graduation.

To foster those connections, NSCSD continues to expand its co-curricular offerings. In recent years, the district has added programs like unified bowling and basketball, girls wrestling and girls flag football–offering more ways for students to feel seen, supported and engaged.

Our students are also embracing how sports and technology intersect. New programs like drone soccer and esports offer innovative and exciting ways for students to learn, collaborate and explore future-ready skills in a team setting.

These successes reflect the district's commitment to fostering a supportive, inclusive environment where students are empowered to explore their passions and build the confidence and skills needed for life after graduation.

State Champs

Last spring, the Cicero-North Syracuse (CNS) High School girls' lacrosse team earned the New York State title for the first time since their back-to-back wins in 1995 and 1996. We anticipate another incredible season with 10 seniors returning to the team. All of these talented athletes are going on to play lacrosse at the college level.

Back to the Basics: District makes Progress in Math and Literacy

BUILDING BLOCKS OF LITERACY HELP STUDENTS SHINE IN THE CLASSROOM

In the NSCSD, we believe reading is the foundation for all learning. That's why one of the district's key strategic goals is to ensure that all students across all grade levels become proficient readers.

This year, we're going back to the basics of literacy instruction by implementing evidence-based curriculum and support systems aligned with the science of reading. These initiatives, part of our ongoing investment in student achievement, are designed to strengthen reading skills at all grade levels.

For our youngest learners, the district has adopted CKLA (Core Knowledge Language Arts) for grades K-4 and EL Education for grades 5-8. These programs build critical background knowledge and vocabulary while emphasizing phonics, fluency and comprehension. At the secondary level, high schools are focusing on Essential Standards in English Language Arts, helping students develop the skills needed for college, careers and lifelong learning.

To support these curriculum efforts, educators are participating in Language Essentials for Teachers of Reading and Spelling (LETRS) training—an intensive professional development series that equips teachers with the tools to deliver high-quality reading instruction. We're also reinforcing school support teams to ensure students receive the right interventions at the right time.

"Reading is the foundation of everything we do in school," said Director of ELA Jamie Sullivan. "When we give students the tools to become strong readers, we open the door to all other learning. Our district's work around literacy is about making sure every student has access to that opportunity."



Roxboro Road Middle School teacher Jennifer Agley is pictured working with a group of students on focused reading. Agley recently commented on the EL Literacy program saying, "I believe the program is doing a great job of holding students to a higher standard. I appreciate how anchoring to a common text across both middle school buildings creates consistency and shared purpose. Additionally, the fishbowl assessments at the end of Modules 1 and 2 have been excellent for encouraging student collaboration and deeper discussion."

Reading is more than just a subject, it is the essential base building block for education. By investing in high-quality literacy instruction, we're ensuring every North Syracuse student has the foundation they need to succeed.

IMPROVING MATH SKILLS

Over the past several years, the NSCSD has made enhancements to its math curriculum. This year, a record 400 students participated in the national MathCON online competition and Math League, programs designed to foster a love for mathematics and improve problem-solving skills. For MathCON, students worked for five months on challenging and unique math problems before participating in a national online assessment on March 6. This year, we achieved the two highest scores we have ever had on the assessment, and more students (62) scored above 200–approximately the 80th percentile—than ever before.

Annual Board of Education Member Election

The Board of Education is the official policy-making body of the NSCSD. The board is composed of nine members who are elected by district voters to three-year terms. Members are not compensated for serving on the board. The terms of three board members expire each June 30 and those members may seek re-election at the annual budget vote. There are three candidates running for three vacant seats due to the expiration of terms. The three candidates with expiring terms are Robert Crabtree, Matthew Hermann and Amanda Sugrue. The three candidates receiving the highest number of votes will be elected to three-year terms (July 1, 2025 to June 30, 2028).

The district does not endorse one candidate over another and reserves the right to edit biographies for space purposes. Candidates are responsible for providing their own biographies and pictures. Candidate names are listed alphabetically, not according to their order on the ballot.

BOARD OF EDUCATION CANDIDATES



Robert Crabtree is serving his fourth term on the NSCSD School Board, having previously served from 2009–2015, including as Vice President from 2013–2015. He returned to the Board in 2019 and has contributed to the Legislative (Chair), Budget and Facilities committees.

He also serves as President of the OCM BOCES Board, where he has been active for nine years on the Facilities, Audit (Chair) and Career & Technical committees. Mr. Crabtree is a member of both the Onondaga County and New York State School Boards Associations and received the Onondaga-Madison School Board Achievement Award in 2017.

A retired North Syracuse elementary teacher of 36 years, Mr. Crabtree was recognized as the 1988 Teacher of the Year and received several honors for excellence in teaching and innovation. He was the subject of three NYS Assembly resolutions recognizing his contributions to education.

He continues to serve the community as a longtime CNS Optimist Club member and advisor, an active member and food pantry coordinator at Immanuel Lutheran Church and a 15-year volunteer with North Area Meals on Wheels. His community service has been honored with awards from NYSUT and the Plank Road Chamber of Commerce.



Matthew Hermann is seeking reelection for a third term on the Board of Education where he has served since July 2019. He currently serves on the Board's Legislative and Facilities committees. Mr. Hermann has lived in the district for the past 58 years and resides in North Syracuse with his wife, Carol Guido. Matthew has three adult children, Jordan, Eric and Sean.

Mr. Hermann is employed by OCM BOCES as a project manager where he supervises multiple technology teams and supports various school districts.

Matthew graduated from Cicero High School and went to Onondaga Community College where he earned Associates Degrees in Administration of Justice and Computer Engineering. He also holds a Bachelors of Science Degree in Computer/ Electronic Engineering from SUNY Polytechnic.



Amanda Sugrue is seeking reelection for a second term on the NSCSD Board of Education. Mrs. Sugrue has lived in the district for 26 years and has served on the Board since July 2022. She is also a member of the Board's Executive Committee. She resides in Clay with her husband, Dennis, a 1993 CNS graduate; daughter, Grace, a 2023 CNS graduate and freshman at Syracuse University; and daughter, Sophie, a CNS class of 2025 student.

Mrs. Sugrue has volunteered in the district helping with the Fall Play, Spring Musical, NSJH Musical, GRMS Musical, Girls Wrestling, Girls Swimming and Diving, and in the classroom and library at KWS Bear Road Elementary School.

Mrs. Sugrue graduated from Liverpool High School in 1994 and from Albany College of Pharmacy in 1999. She is a pharmacist at Wegmans, where she has worked for 34 years.

On the Ballot Explained:

PROPOSITION #1 2025-26 SCHOOL BUDGET

North Syracuse Central School District residents will vote Tuesday, May 20 on a proposed \$224,048,589 spending plan for the 2025-26 school year. It calls for a \$3,045,302/2.91% tax levy increase.

PROPOSITION #2 VEHICLE BONDING PROPOSITION

Each day, district buses safely transport thousands of students to school and home, and back and forth to extracurricular activities and events. All school buses must pass a rigorous state inspection. Maintaining an updated fleet of vehicles helps reduce the cost of repairs and avoid problems associated with rusting frames that prevent the vehicles from passing New York state inspections.

The 2025–26 vehicle proposition includes the following purchases at a total cost not to exceed \$2,396,063:

- Two 65-passenger, gasoline-engine, wheelchair-accessible buses with air conditioning to support students with special needs (\$420,230)
- Eight 65-passenger, gasoline-engine (traditional large) buses (\$1,385,292)
- Two 65-passenger, gasoline-engine buses with 100-gallon fuel tanks and cargo storage bays (\$355,541)
- Maintenance and operations vehicles, including one large mower, one service van, and one truck (\$235,000)

This year's vehicle proposition would result in an annual 0.13% tax increase of approximately \$2.41 annually for a \$100,000 home after aid/before STAR.

PROPOSITION #3 PROPOSITION TO USE GRANT FUNDING FOR VOTER-APPROVED POOL PROJECT

Proposition #3 asks voters to authorize the NSCSD to use a \$3 million grant for the CNS High School pool project. Originally approved by voters in December 2021, the project includes the construction of an approximately 14,500-square-foot addition to the high school to house an indoor pool and related facilities.

Due to higher-than-anticipated construction costs, Assemblyman Al Stirpe has secured an additional \$3 million in funding for the district's aquatic facility. This funding will help address cost challenges related to inflation and the competitive construction market. Approval of this proposition would allow the district to utilize the grant.



There will be no additional cost to the local taxpayers - no impact on the tax levy.

PROPOSITION #4 LIBRARY PROPOSITION (TOWN OF SALINA ONLY)

Each year, residents of the Town of Salina have the opportunity to vote on the Salina Free Library proposition. This proposition is only available for Town of Salina residents. The 2025 proposition asks voters to approve an increase from \$510,565 to \$524,861 with the amount to be raised by levy of a tax upon the taxable property of the district located in the Town of Salina in accordance with Section 259 of the Education Law.

BUDGET 2025-26

Voter Qualifications

In order to vote on the May 20 school budget and election, you must be a United States citizen, 18 years of age or older and meet the following qualifications:

- A resident of the NSCSD for at least 30 days prior to the vote;
- Not under sentence for a felony conviction and not adjudged mentally incompetent;
- Registered to vote in Onondaga County or the NSCSD.

Registration Information

If you are not already registered to vote, you must pre-register by May 15, 2025 to vote on May 20. The NSCSD is holding an evening registration meeting on Tuesday, May 13.

Absentee, Military and Early Voting

All qualified voters in the North Syracuse Central School District are eligible to vote with a mail-in ballot.

Military ballots: may be applied for by qualified voters by requesting an application from District Clerk Jilian Herrera at (315) 218-2131 or jherrera@nscsd.org. Completed applications for military ballots must be received by the Clerk no later than 5 p.m. on April 24, 2025. In a request for a military ballot application or ballot, the military voter may indicate their preference for receiving the application or ballot by mail, facsimile transmission or electronic mail.

Absentee ballots: If a voter is requesting an absentee ballot, they must complete the application and state the reason they will not be able to appear in person on the day of the election/vote. A qualified voter may use an absentee ballot if, on voting day, they are a patient in a hospital or unable to appear personally because of illness or physical disability; is required to be outside the country because of duties, occupation or studies; is on vacation outside the country; or is detained in jail awaiting conviction of an offense other than a felony.

If you are registered as a permanently disabled absentee voter with the Onondaga County Board of Elections, an absentee ballot will be provided to you without having to request an application.
