1. A building tour of Gillette Road Middle School was led by Sarah Jones, principal. Upon return, the committee noted their "notices" and "wonderings" about the building, which can be found at the end of the notes. The agenda for the meeting was presented and reviewed as well.

2. Deb Ayers reviewed the upcoming meeting schedule as follows:

The meeting topics have been reordered based on factors influencing the study outcomes.

3. Deb then reviewed the district's critical question:

"How can the North Syracuse Central School District strategically restructure its staffing, facilities, and grade-level configurations to optimize educational outcomes and emotional well-being for all students, while addressing declining enrollment, reduced state aid, and future growth opportunities like the Micron project?"

- 4. Deb reviewed the meeting takeaways from the August 25, 2025, meeting on facilities.
- 5. Jen Heckathorn led the committee in returning to the Group Activity from the August 25th meeting. The committee reorganized into their groups of 4-5 people and were given a grade level configuration to consider.

They were asked to consider: benefits, costs, obstacles, and aids to that configuration while thinking about all components of the educational program, including academics, facilities, extracurriculars, and transportation.

The groups were given time to finish their brainstorming and note-taking and were asked to pause to hear the Fiscal Overview and Capital Projects presentation.

- 6. Deb Ayers led a Fiscal Overview presentation. She covered the topic of School Budgets, including the subtopics of Balance Sheet, Fund Balance, and Property Taxes.
- 7. Deb Ayers led a presentation on Capital Projects/Building Aid, and incorporated the information from the August presentation on the Building Condition Surveys.
- 8. Deb Ayers also reviewed the findings from the Ross Haber & Associates Study from February 2024. She incorporated the current consultants' observations about the feasibility of the options that Ross Haber & Associates presented.
- 9. Jen Heckathorn led the committee in returning to the group activity. The groups were asked to return to their notes and make adjustments based on the information presented by Deb during the Fiscal Overview and Capital Project presentations. The groups were also asked to plan for their group's report out to the whole group for next meeting by answering the following questions:

- Highlights: what did you spend the most time talking about in your group?
 What are the most important things you want the group to know about your conversation?
- Hidden Gem: What is something you talked about in your group that you don't want to lose sight of?
- Advise: Where did your group land in its thinking? Did you have a consensus? If not, why?
- 10. Deb Ayers reviewed the meeting's takeaways.
 - District is currently in solid fiscal condition.
 - Current reserve funding is adequate but continued exploration of strategies to be intentional about increasing reserve funding is warranted. Reserve funding levels from 5 years ago were inadequate.
 - Use of assigned fund balance should be carefully monitored. Continued increases could jeopardize the district's future fiscal stability
 - Unassigned fund balance level is appropriate
 - North Syracuse current building aid ratio = 84.9%
 - o 2038-39 first year for drop in capital debt
 - Increasing property values
 - Decreasing true value tax rate
 - Significant amount of capital project work has been authorized in past several years
 - 2024 Ross Haber & Associates study presented 4 options for possible building utilization along with reconfiguration change of middle school attendance zones
- 11. The next community advisory committee meeting will be held on **Tuesday**, October 21, 2025, at KWS Bear Road Elementary School. The building tour will begin at 5:30 p.m., and the meeting of the advisory committee will start at 6:00 p.m.
